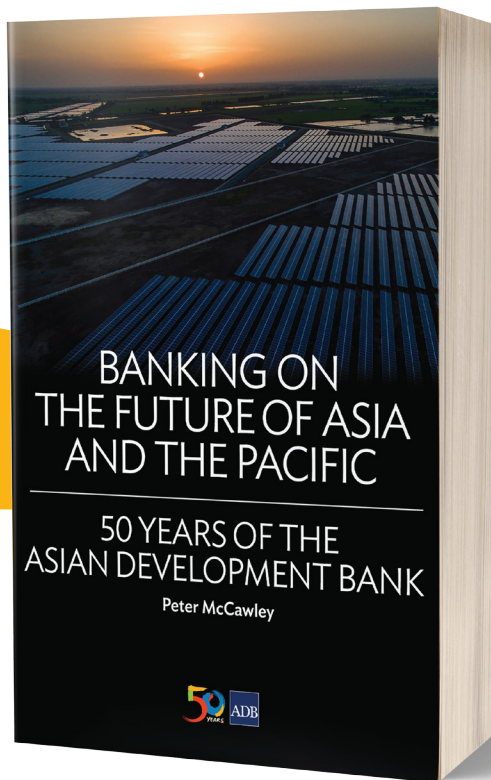

DELIA ALBERT

Board Member, Asian Institute of Management; Former Secretary of Foreign Affairs, Government of the Philippines

Ambassador Delia Domingo Albert is the first woman career

diplomat in Asia to become Secretary of Foreign Affairs. She represented the Philippines in Switzerland, Romania, Hungary, the Federal Republic of Germany and the Commonwealth of Australia. She had a distinguished career in government, receiving national and international awards, and chaired the United Nations Security Council in 2004.



TAKEHIKO NAKAO

President, Asian Development Bank

Mr. Nakao is the President of the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and Chairperson of ADB's Board of Directors. Before joining ADB in 2013, Mr. Nakao had a distinguished career in international finance and development, including senior roles at Japan's Ministry of Finance, where he served as Vice Minister of Finance for International Affairs and Director-General of the International Bureau. He has published books and numerous papers on financial and economic issues.



JIKYEONG KANG

President, Dean, and MVP Chair in Marketing, Asian Institute of Management

Dr. Kang became the first female President CEO of the Asian Institute of Management in

October 2015, just nine months after joining as Dean, a position she continues to hold. Prior to joining AIM, Dr. Kang held senior roles at the Manchester Business School and she has won several national and international awards for her research work.



ALFREDO PASCUAL

Trustee, Philippine Institute of Development Studies; Former President, University of the Philippines

Mr. Pascual joined the Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS) as a member of its Board of Trustees in March 2016. From 2011 to February 2017 he was President of the University of the Philippines where he implemented wide-ranging reforms and programs. Prior to joining the University of the Philippines, Mr. Pascual spent 19 years with ADB working in a variety of roles.



PETER MCCAWLEY

Author, Banking on the Future of Asia and the Pacific: 50 Years of the Asian Development Bank

Dr. McCawley is an economist in the Arndt-Corden Department of Economics at the Australian

National University in Canberra, and has written extensively about development issues in Asia and the Pacific. Much of his work in Asia has been with ADB, where he served as a member of the ADB Board of Directors from 1992 to 1996, and as Dean of the ADB Institute in Tokyo from 2003 to 2007.



ERNESTO M. PERNIA

Secretary of Socioeconomic Planning National Economic and Development Authority

Dr. Pernia is Secretary of Socioeconomic Planning with the National Economic and Development Authority. He previously spent 18 years with ADB as an economist, where he developed and directed projects in many Asian countries. He has held senior positions in academia and currently sits on, or has been a board member of, academic institutions, non-government organizations and business bodies.

SATINDER BINDRA

Principal Director, Department of External Relations, Asian Development Bank

Mr. Bindra joined ADB as Principal Director in the Department of External Relations in 2013. Prior to that he was Director of Communications at the United Nations Development Programme in the US, and from 2008 to 2011, Director of Communications at the United Nations Environment Programme in Kenya. From 1987 to 2007, Mr. Bindra worked as a journalist with leading global media organizations, including CNN and CBS News.
