

# Drivers of biodiversity loss

Human - based

- Habitat destruction, Habitat Change
- Poverty
- Over exploitation
- Pollution
- Apathy, uninformed management
- Poor governance of resources and resource users

Natural

- Diseases
- Predator outbreaks
- Sedimentation

Climate Change

- Increase in temperature
- Sea level rise
- Increase in storm surges
- Increase in CO<sub>2</sub> – ocean acidification








# ASEAN Heritage Park





# ASEAN Biodiversity Outlook 2 (ABO2)


