Social Security as a Human Right & Pillar of **Decent Work**

- Art 22, UDHR -- "Everyone, as a member of society, has the right to social security..."
- Art 25, UDHR -- "Everyone has the right to ... necessary social services & the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood circumstance beyond his control."
- Art 9, ICESCR --"The State Parties to the Present Covenant recognize the right of everyone to social security, including social insurance."

The term "social security" can be broadly defined as an inter

of Human Right **Social security** refers to *"...the* protection which society provides for its members through a series of public measures... to offset the absence or substantial reduction of income from work resulting from various contingencies - to provide people with health care; and - to provide benefits for families with children" [ILO 2000: 29]

Policies of exclusion Unequal treatment/ Discrimination which impact disproportionately on low-waged MWs esp WMW in low-waged & socalled low-skilled jobs & undocumented (CMA study 2012)

Migrants' Access to Social Security and Social Protection remains a Big Challenge

Esp true for MWs in ASIA GCC, SEA and East Asian CODs.

Shifting to private service providers

Largely responds to immediate and temporary protection, but wanting on medium & long-term benefits

The unprecedented expansion of social protection measures during the crisis demonstrates their critical role in promoting a swift and inclusive recovery

1700 New Social Protection Measures

in response to the COVID crisis...



however many measures are temporary, and most are concentrated in high or uppermiddle income countries.

Social protection and emergency relief

Migrant workers are often excluded from COVID-19 social protection and emergency relief:

- In Thailand, migrant workers in the formal sector are entitled to unemployment insurance.
- ILO survey: 43% of those who had lost their jobs received social protection or state-funded relief
- Workplace closures led to loss of income
- Increasing food insecurity
- Loss of remittances

- In 2020, **TRIANGLE in ASEAN** provided <u>emergency assistance to 29,954 migrant workers</u> affected by COVID-19.
- This support included <u>PPE, food, hand sanitizers</u> and other emergency assistance.
- The support was provided through 28 Migrant Worker Resource Centers (MRCs) and other partners in 5 countries.

PH Social Security Programs for OFWs & SSAs for Portability of Benefits

- OWWA Welfare Fund –mandatory for documented migrants; voluntary for undocumented (US\$25)
- Philhealth, PAG-IBIG, SSS including flexi-fund—mandatory (OFW pays)
- Employees' Compensation Commission Program –sea-based
- Compulsory Insurance for all agency-hired (PRAs pay)

Response to Covid:

- DOLE Akap
- OWWA repatriation and uwian na package of assistance, Tabang OFW
- DFA Repatriation etc



Gaps & Ways Forward

WAYS Forward

GAPS

- Exclusion of MDWs & Other Low waged workers in CODs' Labor and Social Laws
- More so for undocumented workers
- Low Level of Awareness on CODs' Social Security Programs
- No Pension Benefits in GCC

- Pro-active nego with CODs for social protection measures for MDWs
- Pro-active monitoring/ oversight of PRAs and employers for effective availment/enjoyment of rights as stipulated in the employment contracts
- Nego for long-term benefits in GCC; explore schemes for shared contributions...



GAPS & Ways Forward

GAPS

- Low level of awareness of OFWs on social protection programs of Ph government; more so ONSite
- Problems in re payments of contributions once OFW is abroad
- Weak reintegration programs

WAYS Forward

- Aggressively engage in sustained info campaign
- Devise ways for better, wider reach to OFWs particularly OnSIte
- Revive the Kabayanihan Project to Harmonize/ coordinate programs, ease collections for Philhealth, Pag-Ibig, SSS
- Strengthen NRCO and its programs; make OWWA more strategic in terms of programs & services; use whole of government-whole of society approach



Final Comments

Social protection/ social security is meant to be a solidary/tripartite program by social partners (with employer/recruitment agency and duty bearers/ governments) to be sustainable and decent

PROBLEMA – OFWs lang ang nagbabayad

Not Sustainable Inferior Package of benefits (Kakaunti) lalo na kung kasama ang pension plans....



- Invest on social protection programs for here and now, during emergency situations and as well for long term protection/benefits
- Must be inclusive, effectively accessed and enjoyed by all including migrant workers, particularly the more vulnerable ones

perhaps we should promote that the ones who have less, must have more, in terms of social protection > social protection floors

- For portability of benefits and totalization of contributions
 - Legal frameworks may need to be reviewed/ amended to be inclusive and responsive to the needs of the times (labor migration phenomenon) –
 - Policies of COO, COD, regional IGOs must be harmonized & simplified
